**COMPREHENSIVE HOMELESS STRATEGY**

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## PURPOSE

Oceanside’s Comprehensive Homeless Strategy serves as a report on the current status of homelessness in the City, its impact on efforts underway, and provides a framework for integrated and coordinated approaches to help the homeless situation. The City cannot respond to this County and Statewide crisis on its own. Many homeless individuals suffer from substance abuse and/or mental health issues which far exceed a City’s ability to respond. Clearly, the County of San Diego which is tasked with “community health” responsibilities, needs to take on an even greater role in Oceanside and North County to make meaningful progress. The State, County, City, and the nonprofit community need to work in concert to make meaningful progress.

By developing a comprehensive homeless strategy, it is anticipated the City and its partners can more effectively meet the needs of the families and individuals who are experiencing homelessness and minimize negative community impacts. Going forward will take dedicated resources likely beyond what is currently available. Oceanside’s climate and beaches, along with the San Luis Rey River flood control channel, and having the North County’s major transit center hub in Oceanside contribute to an attractive environment for the homeless population. Additionally, the County of San Diego has cited two large service Centers (Oceanside Boulevard and Rancho Del Oro Drive) in Oceanside and many social service nonprofit organizations such as Brother Benno’s provide homeless services, which may make Oceanside more susceptible to larger homeless numbers.

## BACKGROUND

Many factors have coalesced to increase the incidences of homelessness in San Diego County over the past several years, including:

- The cost of rental housing has increased dramatically since 2012, while the median household income has remained relatively stagnant
- Low vacancy rates for housing in Oceanside, resulting in Housing Choice (Section 8) voucher holders' inability to find affordable rental units that accept vouchers
- State law changes, such as AB 109, Proposition 47 and 57 have resulted in more people living with mental illnesses, criminal histories, and substance abuse disorders in the community without plans for housing.
- San Diego County jail booking requirements: The San Diego County Sheriff only accepts certain misdemeanor crimes for booking purposes (i.e. warrants, DUI, Domestic Violence). This has resulted in an inability to book many homeless-related crime suspects into jail, and instead requires us to issue a citation.
- Lack of Court filings: The courts are overwhelmed with misdemeanor cases. Currently, the issuing court will only issue serious misdemeanors (i.e. DUI, Domestic Violence). This has resulted in many of our cases involving homeless-related crimes being dropped.
- [The recent 9<sup>th</sup> Circuit Court \(September 2018\) Boise Decision](#) places an extraordinary burden on municipalities. The decision says "So long as there is a greater number of homeless individuals in a city than the number of available beds in shelters, the city cannot prosecute homeless individuals for "involuntarily sitting, lying, and sleeping in public." "That is, as long as there is no option of sleeping indoors, the government cannot criminalize indigent, homeless people for sleeping outdoors, on public property, on the false premise they had a choice in the matter." Homelessness is a County and Statewide challenge; no City is immune, and the Federal, State and County governments need to increase their commitment to municipalities that can't possibly solve the homeless issue on their own. However, the City of Oceanside is rising to meet the challenge as best as possible and is implementing "best practices" as identified by both the League of California Cities and other acknowledged homeless service organizations.

There are a number of actions that the City **cannot** legally take:

- Arrest someone for being homeless
- Clear all brush from the riverbed
- Physically arrest people for trespassing in the riverbed
- Clean out encampments immediately
- Arrest someone for asking for money
- Arrest someone for loitering on public property (people cannot loiter on private property if the property owner prohibits it.)
- Cite or tow RVs or vehicles that are parking in one place for less than 72 hours.
- Put homeless people on busses and ship them out of the City

## OVERVIEW

Homelessness is a multi-faceted issue with many contributing factors, including economic hardship, lack of job skills training, mental illness, substance use disorders, physical disabilities, limited support networks for criminal offenders exiting the system, coupled with reduced policing authority.

As required by the Housing and Urban Development agency, the Neighborhood Services Department in the City of Oceanside participates in the annual [Point-in-Time count](#) of people experiencing homelessness in Oceanside. The count is achieved by dividing the region into mapped segments, canvassing them with staff and community volunteers, and interviewing and counting unsheltered homeless individuals and families. Oceanside's homeless numbers have decreased by 28% since 2016. The last count was done on January 25, 2019 and identified 483 homeless individuals, which was a 9% decrease from 531 in 2017. Despite these successes, significant challenges remain. The next Point-in-Time count is scheduled for January, 2020.

It should be noted that the 2017 outbreak of Hepatitis A in San Diego County caused municipalities to implement further measures to combat the virus that had primarily affected the County's homeless community. The City of Oceanside was, and continues to be, extremely proactive by ensuring that homeless individuals and homeless service providers, along with City staff who serve the homeless, were vaccinated. In 2017, over 2,500 individuals in the at-risk population in Oceanside were vaccinated. All of the City's first responders, as well as other City staff who may come in contact with the homeless community were vaccinated. Other Oceanside actions continue to include sanitizing public areas and opening the winter homeless shelter early.

## CITY OUTREACH EFFORTS

The City of Oceanside uses multiple approaches and partnerships to serve those experiencing homelessness in the community and works toward alleviating the effects of homelessness. The City has engaged stakeholders to develop results-based efforts to address homelessness, including:

### City Council

The City Council adopted a Resolution on October 3, 2018, to declare a temporary shelter crisis, to allow churches to shelter up to 50 homeless people without having to obtain a Condition Use Permit, and to open November 1, 2018 through April 15, 2019. On October 17, 2018, the City Council adopted a Resolution allowing the City to be eligible to apply, through our Continuum of Care (COC) for the State of California Homeless Emergency Aid Program (HEAP). Staff requested funds for:

- Two (2) new Social Workers via contract, to support the City's second Homeless Outreach Team (HOT) that is authorized as of July 1, 2019, as well as Housing Authority to assist homeless individuals with housing navigation, plus all required equipment and related on and offsite costs.
- Support development of a database to assist with reporting requirements and tracking of services (internal and external)
- Bus passes to help individuals with transportation barriers in apartment searches and/or retaining housing
- Purchase a HOT van that will include a disabled lift and installation of computer terminal and new vehicle maintenance

On June 6, 2018, the City Council approved an Ordinance and Resolution to place a ½ cent Sales Tax Measure on the November 6, 2018 ballot after much research, polling and community outreach.

On November 6, 2018, Oceanside voters approved "Measure X" by 55.7%. On November 28, 2018, the City Council adopted an Ordinance creating the Citizens Oversight Committee (COC), approved By-Laws and the Responsible Spending Pledge. The focus of Measure X is to enhance public safety and improve infrastructure. The tax is in place for seven (7) years and will expire in 2026.

**On March 21, 2019, the Measure X COC approved the Fiscal Year 2019/2020 Spending Plan that included the following items related to homelessness:**

1. Additional Homeless Outreach Team (2 Officers and 1 vehicle) (vehicle is one-time cost)	\$376,357	Ongoing

The City Council also approved a number of Ordinances that enable the enforcement of quality of life issues such as a smoking ban, loitering ban, and shopping cart blight removal. A Shopping Cart Ordinance was adopted on August 8, 2018, and became effective January 1, 2019. The purpose of the Ordinance was to reduce blight and the prevalence of stolen or abandoned shopping carts throughout the City. The Ordinance requires businesses to have a plan to keep carts on their sites (i.e. employ a locking mechanism) or contract with a retrieval service. The Business License Inspector visited all Oceanside stores with shopping carts. Staff is working with several retailers not yet in compliance to adhere to the Ordinance requirements.

On April 17, 2019, the City Council approved the Spending Plan at a Budget Workshop and final budget adoption occurred on June 5, 2019.

Additionally, as part of the FY 2019/20 budget, OPD was given an additional \$325,000 in overtime for increased Encampment Detail and for downtown patrols. \$30,000 was allocated for two (2) new hourly Police Cadet positions to support the HOTs.



## Oceanside Neighborhood Services Department

- Works with the Alliance for Regional Solutions, a coalition of nine cities and more than 50 non-profit service providers and funders. The Alliance was first assembled to develop a winter homeless shelter system. This was accomplished 13 years ago, and is now evolving into a “Bridge to Housing” program to move chronically homeless individuals and families into permanent housing. The Alliance has taken the lead in North County to implement the Coordinated Entry System, a centralized data system used by agencies to ensure that services are being coordinated in order to maximize resources and alleviate duplication of homeless services.
- Implemented the “Housing First” model, a recovery-oriented approach to ending homelessness that centers on quickly moving people experiencing homelessness into independent and permanent housing, and then providing additional supports and services as needed.
- Allocated 1,529 Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers as of June 2019. Of 1,529 vouchers:
  - 30 are for homeless veteran families and chronically homeless single persons referred through the Coordinated Entry System (CES)
  - 96 are for Project One for All (POFA), a program dedicated to severely mentally ill homeless persons referred through CES
  - 100 are for Veteran’s Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) for homeless veterans referred by the Veterans Administration
  - 50 are for Project Based Vouchers (PBV); 25 serve homeless people with HIV/AIDS and 25 serve homeless families
  - 86 are for the Family Unification Program, which serves families with active cases with the San Diego County Health and Human Services Administration Child Welfare Services Division. These families have been separated, or are at risk of being separated due to inadequate housing
  - 145 are for non-elderly people with disabilities at risk of becoming homeless
- Maintains the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher waiting list of 5,696 households, which means an approximately eight-year wait.
- Have assisted an average of 1,496 families per month thus far in 2019 by providing rental assistance through the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Programs, including some which have “ported” to Oceanside from other jurisdictions.
- Maintains one (full-time equivalent) Social Worker within the Housing Authority, which may be increased if the HEAP grant is awarded in June 2019. Social Workers assist homeless people who have received a voucher with locating suitable housing and provide additional referrals and counseling to assist with the transition to permanent housing. In addition, the Social Workers provide resources to voucher holders (who are often people with mental or physical disabilities) who are at risk of becoming homeless.

## **Oceanside Police Department (OPD) Homeless Outreach Team**

The Homeless Outreach Team (HOT) provides real-time services and engagement for individuals and families living on the street or in places not meant for habitation. As previously mentioned, the City Council approved a second HOT beginning July 1, 2019. These activities are designed to be proactive and use a multi-disciplinary approach. The Oceanside Police Department's Homeless Outreach Teams operate in public spaces throughout Oceanside, as well as holding standing office hours for walk-ins. The City has recently expanded the Homeless Outreach Team's capacity to better connect those experiencing homelessness with available resources by adding a full time Social Worker to accompany the Homeless Outreach Team; A second Social Worker will begin July 1, 2019. This is in addition to the two (2) full time Social Workers in the Neighborhood Services Department beginning July 1, 2019. The Social Workers partner and assist the HOTs in the field and links the homeless with necessary services throughout the County.

Health and Human Services Agency (HHS) Nurses have also assisted in the field in administering Hepatitis A vaccinations. In Home Outreach Team, (I-HOT), a subsidiary of Mental Health Systems, and McAlister Institute social workers also assist HOT on a weekly basis. ALPHA Project and the Regional Taskforce for the Homeless (RTFH) participate in office hours, collaborating with HOTs and the clients they share. HOTs participate in several community and County meetings and working groups, including the regional HHS-led quarterly meetings. These meetings are a collaboration of all San Diego County HOT teams and service providers in an effort to share resources and best practices to address homeless issues in each particular region. A monthly housing navigation meeting is organized by RTFH and is a collaboration of North County service providers who meet to train on the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), share information regarding specific programs, and case conference ideas regarding shared clients.

To complement the HOTs efforts, the City frequently partners with Psychiatric Emergency Response Teams (PERT) to discuss best practices to address common clients. The Social Workers who assist HOTs attend the monthly PERT roundtable meetings.

In addition to the Police HOTs, OPD fields "Neighborhood Policing Teams" throughout the community. Members of the Neighborhood Policing Team have specialized training in Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED). Members of the community can take advantage of an Oceanside Police Department CPTED analysis, where suggestions are provided to reduce the likelihood of crime taking place at businesses and residences. Lighting type, vegetation, fencing, and access to water and power all play a role in whether a location is more or less susceptible to crime. Neighborhood Policing Teams also respond to community concerns about homelessness and they are available to meet with community groups and homeowner associations by contacting the Police Department at 760-435-4900.

**The following is a summary of Encampment Detail statistics from OPD and Code Enforcement:**

Since fiscal year 2018/19, there are Encampment Details four times per week.

**Code Enforcement**

The Code Enforcement Division works in concert with the Police Department, Neighborhood Services Department, City Attorney’s Office, and City Manager’s Office to address illegal homeless encampments throughout the community. To report an encampment, please call Oceanside Customer Care at 760-435-4500 or use the free “My Oceanside” app which seamlessly routes issues to City departments for handling. Displaced homeless individuals are counseled via the social workers’ attempt to meet their needs, including appropriate referral for mental health, sober in-services and shelters. The City’s FY2019/20 budget included an additional \$40,000 for Encampment Detail overtime.

**Oceanside Public Library**

Civic Center Library provides table space in the foyer area on a weekly basis for local organizations who are helping the homeless population:

- **Interfaith Services** - provides resources for people experiencing homelessness with the goal of helping them into the workforce.
- **McAlister Institute** - provides resources and information on basic needs
- **Serenity House** - provides resources and information on basic needs geared specifically to women
- **TAY** - provides information and assistance to Transitional Aged Youth

Both the Civic Center and Mission Branch Library community rooms were used as Hepatitis A vaccinations sites by the County’s Health and Human Services staff. Library staff helped spread the word to their target audience.

For the past three years, the Library has been a sign-up and pick-up site for the San Diego Stand Down event that is hosted by Veterans Village every summer. The Library also participated in the first North County Stand Down event last February.

- Writes grant submissions, implements, and administers homeless services funding
- Social workers assist homeless and formerly homeless with vouchers to locate and maintain suitable housing
- Sets aside Housing Choice vouchers for homeless families/individuals
- Administers rental assistance programs
- Coordinates Homeless Point-in-Time count with Regional Task Force
- Serves homeless population at City Resource Centers and Senior Centers
- Provides referrals to families experiencing homelessness to community resources such as shelters, food banks, and social services
- Serves as point-of-contact for non-profit and county service providers in the City.
- Manages encampment details through Code Enforcement, including clean-up and removal of encampment debris
- Searches and applies for appropriate grants

- Use the free City app ("My Oceanside") to report non-emergency issues
- Volunteer with [Miracle Messages](#), a non-profit that helps reunite people with their families
- Lobby county, state, and federal representatives for enhanced homeless crisis support
- Do not provide money, clothing, or food to homeless individuals. Provide those items to appropriate charitable organizations

## ACTION ITEMS

- Ensure that all City departments are tracking homeless-related expenditures
- Ensure cross-departmental communications, especially with Neighborhood Services, Police, Fire, City Attorney, and City Manager to share information and to strengthen efforts
- Continue to build partnerships with neighboring cities, agencies and organizations to build capacity for future rapid rehousing and connection to services
- Create educational materials for residents and businesses on how to address or report homeless-related concerns
- Protect and increase supply of affordable housing in Oceanside
- Use new forms of active outreach to landlords with the goal of increasing voucher usage
- Identify new funding options; apply for appropriate grants
- Search for Bridge Housing monies
- Search out appropriate training for City staff regarding homeless issues
- Balance the needs to keep public areas and streets clean and safe with the rights and needs of people who have no home
- Consider expanding Winter Shelters
- Work with North County Cities and elected officials to analyze options for a year-round North County shelter
- Engage with (and lobby) county, state and federal representatives to make reducing homelessness a top priority
- Encourage the County of San Diego to allocate more resources for mental illness, substance abuse, affordable housing, sheltering, etc.
- Continue to analyze best practices, such as the Housing First model
- Encourage service organizations to engage with nonprofit service providers that help the homeless population
- Expand efforts to prevent homelessness through Housing programs
- Apply for State Homeless Emergency Aid Program block grant funding

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## 2.4 Transitional Housing

Transitional housing/shelter is generally provided in apartment style facilities with a higher degree of privacy than short-term homeless shelters; may be provided at no cost to the resident; and may be configured for specialized groups within the homeless population such as people with substance abuse problems, homeless mentally ill, homeless domestic violence victims, veterans or homeless people with AIDS/HIV.

In some cases, a “transition in place” option allows families to continue living in the same complex (if not the same unit) where their transitional housing unit is located when they are ready to move to permanent housing. In other cases, the permanent housing option is either public housing or private rental housing supported by a tenant-based voucher subsidy. Included are post-domestic violence shelter housing programs that make affordable rental housing (or other accommodations) available to women, generally those who are coming directly out of a domestic violence shelter or other crisis shelter, often apartment complexes owned by the shelter.

Medi-Cal covers low-income adults, families with children, seniors, persons with disabilities, pregnant women, children in foster care and former foster youth up to age 26. Medi-Cal qualified individuals are required choose a managed care health plan during enrollment.
